SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, 2005-2006, half the money would go to support need-based aid programs. The other half would be used for three programs, innovative grants, teacher mentoring, and loan forgiveness for teachers.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: So they would all be education related. That all...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you. Thank you, Senator Schimek and Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to give you a few figures that have come from the state lottery which we now are moving in different directions. The funds respectively totaled to the date, our Education Innovation Fund, we have pumped \$84,672,334 into that fund from gambling interests in this state. That's a huge amount of money. Also in Environmental Trust, \$66,211,338; Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund, which we're accused of not, from the recent letters we received this morning with the five-dollar bills in them, I want them to realize that there is
