over \$3 million has been brought into the gamblers, Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund. I hope they hear this, and we are not ignoring those. We did move that money back to the General Fund. Now we are going to keep it, keep part of it in the new proposal that Senator Raikes is offering us where 24.75 will go to the Education Innovation and 24.75 to the Nebraska Scholarship Fund. That still leaves the Environmental Trust with the 49.5 percent, and the Compulsive Gamblers will still receive the 1 percent. So I wanted to bring this to your attention that what is happening, especially those of you...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...that are antigambling in this body and any of your constituents, what, how many dollars have been brought into this state by the small lottery that we have operating right now. I would...and there are several other areas that throughout the years we have helped people with education from that 49.5 percent that comes from the Nebraska lottery. With that, thank you very much for the time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Your light is next, Senator Janssen. Do you waive off? He does. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. Senator Raikes, I'd like to engage in a little conversation, if you please.

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR VRTISKA: You talked about \$4 million being transferred out of the lottery into the scholarship fund. Where did that money come from before?

SENATOR RAIKES: Senator, currently, okay, if you go back like three years, that...the education portion of the lottery money, which is again roughly \$8 million a year; you got \$8 million for education, \$8 million for environment, and an amount for gambling anonymous or gamblers anonymous.
