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that you would build onto a Veterans Hospital the match should be available, but I'm not...

SENATOR PREISTER: There's a priority list. Right now, the Thomas Fitzgerald current home is in such bad shape that we...

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yeah, I understand.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...move ahead in priority. If we have a new home and we just want to expand, I don't think that priority would be the same and I think we enter into a different type of situation.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay. Well, those are some of the questions that I had and obviously I, with a lot of other people, are certainly looking forward to a better facility for our veterans that we certainly need with what's up there, because I've been there. I know that the facility is not what we should be providing for veterans who served this country, so I'm interested in...but, you know, there's lots of details and, of course, we all understand that the fiscal situation of the state is a dire position. But I guess we need to adopt priorities that are important, particularly to veterans. And so I'm going to be watching this closely and see what can...one other question I had. Do you have any idea idea about land costs or if you would move further away from the part of Omaha that you had that land costs might be cheaper?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I suspect land is a great deal of this money, isn't it, that many acres?

SENATOR PREISTER: Land will be a part of it. The cost of that land, whether it's outside or inside closer, will make a difference. But we have another factor that's involved. You can't have two veterans' homes closer than I believe it's 100 miles apart, and we do have a veterans' home in Norfolk. So it limits how far outside or how far west of Omaha we can even consider, because we have to be beyond that difference from the Norfolk Veterans' Home.
