will match? Is that done by population or do you know that, or maybe does Senator Preister know that?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I don't know that answer. Maybe Senator Preister does. I would say it would appear to me, based on this schedule outline that I enumerated a few minutes ago about from starting in June of this year if the funding is approval (sic), it would appear to me that a year from now, or next session at least, we could make some adjustments because it's cited at February 4 the architecture engineer selection/hire, and July 4 of next year is design development. So I would assume, if things got particularly rosy, we would have about a year here yet to make an adjustment, but that's strictly a guess. It's no promise.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I just think that if we're going to...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Excuse me. Thank you.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Thank you, Senator Schimek. (Visitors introduced.) Chair would recognize Senator Hartnett, to be followed by Senator Brown and Senator Preister. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, Senator Preister, can I ask you a question? When we're talking before is that the reason we're limiting the size of the veterans' home right now, is it because the match that the state has to kick in to get the federal funds? Is that true?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Preister.

SENATOR PREISTER: Yes, I would respond. And, yes, Senator Hartnett, that is the reason. If we appropriated more money we could get more beds, but this is a one to two match. We put in one-third; the federal government puts in the other two-thirds. Depending on how much of our third we put in and say this is set aside, and it has to be earmarked, it has to be set aside, we as a body can't just say we'll do it, the money has to be
