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because I think what decisions we make today, I'm going to probably see more of those than probably any member here, and so I realize that those decisions are also going to have an impact on the rest of my life as a citizen of this state. So I probably have a little different perspective, and probably rightfully so. I appreciate the discussion. I'll continue to listen. But I also wanted to make sure that within the record, within the discussion, that in no means is my opinion and my perspective and philosophy in any way to be interpreted as disrespectful or unappreciative of the work that's already been put into the proposals, whether it be this bill or other bills. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Erdman. Senator Brashear, on AM1111.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, thank you, members of the body. Senator Wehrbein, I wonder if you'd yield, please.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein, would you yield?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Senator Wehrbein, in my dealings, your summarizing of page 5, I am...am I reading the presentation accurately in terms of the out biennium? Again, I'm using round numbers. That may be difficult for you. You're probably very precise. But if we take the \$360 from the \$800 million, that is the shortfall in that out biennium, correct?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Generally speaking, yes. It has an impact on the reserve requirement and things like that, but generally you have to flow through.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: So that is...that is bad news for the future. It is something to be aware of. Is that a fair conclusion?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: All right. I understand I'm leading you. You'll tell me I'm wrong when I ask you. And this is premised
