years, to try to do that. I think we have the time now, we have the opportunity, and if anything, as difficult as it is, we need to perhaps over-engineer this one a little bit. I did sit in on part of the Friday meeting of the Forecasting Board. It's a very, very interesting process. I would encourage any of you that have an opportunity to sit in on that for an hour or two some time, the next time they meet, to take the opportunity to do that. It is a process that, of course, involves a lot of assumptions, and I won't go so far as to say guesswork because they certainly include a lot of data in the process and they do it probably as good as it could be done. But things are still out there that we need to worry about as we adopt this budget. We don't know when, or how, or what the result will be on the potential low-level nuclear lawsuit, but it's out there. I'm not saying we should appropriate money for it by any means, but I'm saying that if we allow some extra money in our Cash Reserve, that it might be very prudent to do so. The health insurance cost area isn't something that looks like it's going to turn around and take a different direction for us. All of our employees, University of Nebraska employees,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...they're all facing likely increases. For that reason, when we come down to finding a solution here, I'm going to be quite suspect of any transfers or gimmicks to fill the gap. I use "gimmicks." It's not a derogatory term, but I want us to solve the budget with real money and have a healthy reserve planned, perhaps more than the minimum, so that in case we have any of these contingencies, another disaster could occur. This is an unsettled world. As we're here today, it's certainly far from being a stable international situation and those all, unfortunately, have an effect on us sooner or later. Last point, if I have time, I have a strong desire that the Legislature craft the budget...
