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doctorate degree. I'm not going to say they're not worth it. But I do know that the people in rural Nebraska that worked at the research center there and worked with the extension said, you know, we don't need a salary increase, considering the times the way they are. But they got it anyway. Now these tenured faculty, they're not being eliminated; they're moving them to Lincoln. And you know, you've heard me say this, my district produces more corn than any district in this...any legislative district in this state. That area of the state is the corn producing capital of the state. You go from Lexington to Seward, and that's where the irrigation is. And they're moving those people...they're keeping the research farm open. I'm thankful for that. And I guess they're going to have their scientists commute from Lincoln to Clay Center and back. And I guess that makes sense. I'm not in that position to know. I do know they have an Academic Planning Review Committee. And people from Clay Center, Senator Kremer, Senator Stuhr, and I, we went through that process, and we had the hearing. And the Academic Planning Review Committee recommended that the university not do this. But of course, it wasn't their decision. It was Chancellor...Vice Chancellor Owens and Chancellor Perlman's positions to do this. But it's almost getting to the point where I feel like it's the University of Lincoln and Omaha, not the University of Nebraska. And unlike Omaha, we can't offer them incentives to get them to stay in Clay Center. But when the university does that, it just increases the woes in rural Nebraska. And the communities like Lincoln and Omaha that are growing, it just helps them. Five wonderful jobs, high-paying jobs, moving to Lincoln, all in the name of ag research. And both...by the way, did I mention that we just went through the worst drought in 100 years, and the University of Nebraska didn't have an irrigation specialist? Do you know that slot isn't filled? We don't have an irrigation specialist in this state. Now, I know they're looking for one. I'm grateful for that. But I guess if they hire one, that...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...person is also going to be located in Lincoln, never mind there's very little irrigated land in Lancaster County. It's all in the York, Hamilton, Phelps,
