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with base expansion, which I think is 30 votes, and it will be up to this body. I'm going to vote for all of it and I'm going to vote for the Appropriations Committee, but if we don't, it seems to me I think we want to get as many pieces as we can to be able to pass with as few votes as possible to endorse as much of this hard work as possible. If I had to make a prediction, it will come down to how much base expansion we do, and that base expansion will leave us some place between either 30 or 60 million dollars shy from where the Appropriations Committee will be.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. Speaker, am I...is there close to close, or is there other speakers?

SPEAKER BROMM: There's another speaker after yourself.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I will delay then, if I may.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: He didn't delay because I was going to speak next. Mr. Speaker and the members of the body, on the way up to our assembly this afternoon, I was walking with Senator Wehrbein and I made the statement to him that I don't think that there was anybody in this body that I would have preferred to have in his position for the last several months and now when we're discussing this. It's been a magnificent job. I think it behooves any of us that are going to criticize what the job that they have done to step forward and say what you would do instead. To just say that you can't support this, to me, doesn't seem to be very helpful. A couple of things that I think have been done, need to be done further, one is in Health and Human Services Committee with Senator Jensen. Both in the special session and this time around, we've cut over 22,000 people off of the rolls. This has been quite a reversal in the
