Landis feel to it--grab a piece of paper, splash it out there and pass it out--but I didn't know how much time I'd have this morning. But it clarifies for you what's going to happen in this biennium and then what happens in the next biennium, the \$381 million increase in state aid. Finally, if you do have a copy of my handout, I call it "Life After State Aid," I just want to show you on page 7 where I've run some numbers there. You have the projected shortfall. I used \$360 as the number. Eliminate state aid in the second year of the biennium, \$616 million. Now you can see the numbers for yourself. If we do what I think we should do in education, we would have to spend another \$100 million in special education. That's that line item. And we would develop a new alternative education program, which is the next line item. Leaves us with a \$39 million cushion. That's not much of a cushion, but I'll say two things to that. One, I just want to show you, there are other possibilities besides the piecemeal patchwork tax hike approach. The other thing is I have not figured in here the "People's Tax Plan," which apparently, I think I heard Senator Brashear say this morning, that would be another \$160 million added to the bottom line. So...and I would be willing to embrace some of those other taxes if they were part of a comprehensive program of reform that I think is necessary. That's all I have to offer right now. I'll wait and see if anybody else has other questions. Thank you, Mr. President.
