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because the money is running low. And I got to thinking, you know, instead of figuring out how to fund cops in the basic schools, I'd rather figure out how to do a better alternative education program so that children that need police supervision are not in the basic schools. The schools should not be social service agencies. They shouldn't have to contend with that. And so that's why, and I visited with some. Waverly has what I'll call, I guess, a regional alternative education program. It takes students from its own system...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR MAXWELL: Sorry.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr and Senator Maxwell. Senator Friend.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the Legislature, a well-known senator in this body told me, I guess a couple months ago, to be careful about the things you say on the floor because you could lose credibility. I'm not too worried because I don't have any credibility right now, so I'm just going to go ahead and say what I want. I figured I had to earn that credibility some day. I'll try that later on. I've actually, at a pretty high level, talked with Senator Maxwell about this proposal that he has up. I don't know any...a whole lot more about it than anybody else, and I'm sure that's a little bit due to the fact of, you know, the schedule and some of the things that have been happening the last three months won't allow for that. But there have been a lot of things thrown around about whether this is procedurally...whether we're capable of doing it procedurally. I don't know that I want to delve into that, and mainly because there are so many people here that have a better understanding procedurally how to approach these things than I do at this point in my life. However, let's assume just for a second that procedurally this effort or this proposal flies. What I would say, if that were the case, is that I can't think of a better time to deal with something like this than now. I've said that before. I just
