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believe, again assuming that this is procedurally correct or everything is fine from that standpoint, that the time is now. Four years from now, it's been well-documented and it's been documented on record that four years from now half this body is gone. Eight years from now everybody is gone. The talent level is depleted. The David Landises, the Ernie Chamberses, the Matt Connealys, who else? I mean, Chris Beutler, Mick Mines, it doesn't matter, they're gone. We've got to find something that we don't have to twist and turn for these people that come in to deal with. Either that, or somebody better come up with some sort of brainstorm to get rid of term limits, because that scares me. It scares me right now. Doesn't scare me that I won't be here. That's...I already told you, I may have the shortest political career of all of us. But the bottom line, it scares me that there won't be the talent there to deal with these issues. I think that is just one aspect of what we're dealing with as far as the time. The other thing is, with the increasing problems or the funding issues that we have or that we foresee, the forecasting problems with things like Medicaid, the healthcare industry in general, the train wreck that everybody talks about is waiting to happen. We don't need this gorilla, as Senator Maxwell so aptly put, hanging over our heads. We need to get rid...now, again, let's step back a second and let's say procedurally it doesn't work. When I talked about unconventional behavior, I think it applies. If this has to go through the hearing process, you know, fine. I think this, Senator Bourne touched on it, is an excellent, out-of-the-box thought and theory. I just think before we all close our eyes to it let's hear a little more debate. Let's hear what folks think of it. I could be wrong. I'll be wrong again. I've got four years to keep being wrong, but I'd like to hear some other views on this proposal. So I will yield my time to...I don't know how much time I have left, Mr. Speaker. I'll yield it back to the Chair if it's not much.
