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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. I'm not going to belabor this. This is the last time I'm probably going to speak. But I did want to respond to a couple of things. And, Senator Schrock, what you just said, I want to respond to. I don't want to shut down private schools at all in this state, either. But, you know, a lot of these schools do have endowments and other kinds of funds from which they can help fund some of these scholarships. I'm not saying all of them do, and I don't know the financial status, but I am highly suspicious that there are funds available if our funds are withdrawn. I did say in the beginning that I think it would be good to have some kind of a transition period in this, and maybe we'll discuss that at some point. I don't know. The other thing that I wanted to say, and, Senator Redfield, once again you got me to turn on my light, the program sounds marvelous. I mean, I certainly would like to encourage more of those kinds of programs, both for the sake of the mother but also for the sake of the child because the child's welfare is going to be better. But there are a lot of wonderful programs out there in a lot of different arenas that we don't fund because they're not state programs. And I guess...in a way I guess this is being a little hard-nosed, but I don't think that we can afford to keep funding private educational institutions in any way when we can't fund our public ones. I don't think it's right that a constituent in my district, for instance, is going to be let go by the University of Nebraska from the state museum program. I think the state museum program is absolutely one of the treasures of our state, and we're letting him go. If we could take some of this money, maybe we could even help some of those kinds of things from happening to our public institutions. So I've been harping on this a lot longer than just when we're in a fiscal kind of crisis, because I think it's the principle that matters as much as the dollars that matter. But I've been saying for some time now that there are things that we need to do that we are not doing because we are spending money like this to help private institutions. And in the ideal world, there would be lots of money and there would be lots of ways to help programs that aren't really state programs. But I don't think that we're ever going to be in that position. So, thank you very much. I'll give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers, if he would
