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everything on the playing field. I know some of the people here that were talking against this, I know they've gone to private colleges and they've paid their own way. They probably didn't use any type of scholarship, perhaps, except maybe a merit scholarship that they earned otherwise, and that's fine. That's well and good. But here we're talking about kids, we're talking about students, we're talking about needy students, and under the new formula...that's why I agree with Senator Raikes, what he came up with...we're putting everything on a level playing field so that no matter where you go you're not going to get any more or any less than if you go just to public schools. So...and this I think we need to phase out because if you've already got kids in school then all at once you're going to say, whoops, you can't go, you can't finish your schooling. Now, in the veterinary school that the university was...is dealing with as far as getting rid of that, well, now they have come around and those people who are already in vet school, they're going to phase them out as they graduate and then perhaps overhaul the program. So I think, in all fairness, I think we should continue on with Senator Raikes' bill, the way he's got it set up, and not vote for Senator Chambers' amendment. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Engel. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Mr. President, painfully, I yield my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have almost five minutes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Erdman. Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, I hear all this talk now about the students. You're cutting UNL's money. I'd like to ask Senator Engel a question.
