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before me, will increase trade between the United States and Mexico while protecting workers' rights and helping Mexicans become productive members of the Nebraska work force. His name is Jose Cuevas. I hope I'm saying that right. And the Mexican consulate in Omaha is basically an extension of the Mexican government in Nebraska. Mexican citizens can go there to access many of services that they would find in their home country. Our job is here to help them, and I think that's great and I'm pleased that we have that right within our state. Also, I do support and have watched the appropriation process looking at the commissions. I think it's very worthwhile and I support Senator Thompson's study to do that. And if we're going to keep the Mexican Commission, I really think that we ought to expand that. We have certainly in Omaha and elsewhere. We have in Columbus Guatemalans, Hondurans. We have a large group of Sudanese now in Omaha and those people I think also need help and assistance in integrating into our society. And so I think that it would be a much better activity for the state to combine some of the commissions so that they can help not only the Mexicans, not only the...those...the Indian Affairs, but to help all of those who are coming into our society, who are working here, who are certainly a great, great part of our work force in the construction industry as well as many other industries that we have within our state. And so I think we'd be better off if we expanded the terminology, and I think really that's what Senator Thompson was talking about in her resolution, that we would take and look at all of the minorities, all of the immigrant societies that have come into our state. I don't know how I will vote on the Chambers amendment. I certainly understand that those people do need some help, but I think we need to expand it beyond there to include many other groups in our society. So I certainly would support Senator Thompson's resolution. Also, I appreciate what the Appropriations Committee did in trying to bring all this together. I know when I speak at various groups, occasionally I'll have with me the book on boards and commissions, which you know is huge. And Senator Schimek has worked in her committee also to look at those and see if those are all needed. And I do like the fact that we have participation of a great many of our citizens within the boards, in the commissions; but, however, once you start one it's really difficult ever to end that unless you put
