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members that were on the board in 2000 when this particular Blue Book was printed. I think there is a new one coming out shortly and that membership has probably changed. The point of it is, of reading that list of names to you, is to show you that it really is a statewide organization that really does involve people from all over the state. And I'm sure that the impact has been felt in the communities from which these members come. I, once again, would urge that we consider thinking about maybe not making this immediate, but giving the commission a little bit of time to regroup and decide how it can continue to carry out its function if, indeed, it can continue to carry out its mission. I would liken this a little bit to the fate of the Rural Development Commission, which is now no longer a state agency but is going to become a nonprofit agency, a stand-alone agency that functions independently of government. And I sincerely hope...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...that that will be a successful venture because I think the Rural Development Commission, like the Women's Commission, is a very worthwhile entity. So I would hope that maybe if, indeed, the Women's Commission, you don't choose to fund it for both years, it could be at least funded for one year so that it would have that opportunity to organize itself and get ready for that eventuality. Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers, and this will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Members of the Legislature, Senator Schimek is having an amendment drafted which will provide funding for just the first year, and I'm speaking to try to give some time for that amendment to be drafted. I agree with all that Senator Schimek has said. I recognize the difference that people may see between this commission and the other two, but I hope nobody would deny the fact that women are confronted by problems in this society. There are still some things that are deemed "women's work." There are still some restrictions that women are expected to adhere to, even though they are totally irrational and
