SENATOR SCHIMEK: I get your point, Senator, and I should tell you that every once in a while, I get letters addressed to Mr. Schimek.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Oh, (laugh)...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, I do.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Well, that's because you have such a (laugh)...do you want some of my time, Senator Chambers? Yes, I give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Hartnett. My seatmate is Senator Marian Jones...I meant not Marian Jones, Marian Price. There is a track star named Marian Jones. In her own right, though, the "Duchess" does pretty well, but she has shown me letters where they address her as Mister. So that is a common thing. I'll tell you something that really offended me when I first came down here. In the media, they would refer to male senators as Senator So-and-So. They'd refer to Senator Labeledz as Mrs. Labeledz. So I talked to people in the newspapers, and I said, she is not down here as a wife, she is down here as a senator and everybody on this floor should be addressed as a senator. They didn't immediately stop doing that. But those, they don't do those things anymore. But so much that is ordinary now and taken for granted resulted as a...resulted from a struggle which should never have had to be made. If a person holds a position and there is a title that goes with that position, that is the title anyone should be accorded when that position is being designated, regardless of gender, but it was not. Before I got a bill passed down here, female employees of this state received a lesser payout when they were receiving their pensions than males because, and this was the attitude around the country, they live longer. I say, well, they pay the same amount in. Each item they purchase at the store or anyplace else costs them as much as a man, and not every female lives longer than every male. So we had to pass legislation to require...
