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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that there be no discrimination in these programs, and it was a female who brought to my attention, Cindy Grandberry, who works in my office. When the Hewitt Center was built for the athletes at the campus, women were to be excluded, and I offered a resolution attacking that, and my colleagues didn't even know that was happening and they didn't agree with it. But women, even in modern times, have been placed in the back of the bus, if they're allowed on it at all. And then they are given a head scarf, a bucket, and a sponge to mop the floor of the bus. So this is one of those issues which I hope we will view seriously. And if we adopt Senator Schimek's amendment, and you want to reduce the amount for the first year, I can't speak for Senator Schimek or anybody else, but I would be amenable to that. But because drafting this amendment is so difficult because of the way...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...my amendment is structured. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Hartnett. Senator Kruse, on the Schimek amendment.

SENATOR KRUSE: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I support the Schimek amendment for the reasons I've already stated, don't need to restate. This would force the conversation and the policy thought that I spoke to earlier. I think it's necessary to do that and, hopefully, that would bring persons to the table. I would hope that in this, if we choose to do this, that we give no instructions to the commission as to what they should do or any assumptions about what they're going to do. They should be free to do their own thing. My wife, Ruth, was chair of the Women's Commission 25 years ago, and from that experience, she and I have often spoken about the tremendous change that has taken place in those days. In those days, she and the commission were fussing with the Governor about the possibility that there is spouse abuse, and the officials of
