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because it is a unique bill, and a justification can be shown for that. And I think what you're suggesting is the way it ought to be done. And I will talk to the Speaker about that. But I wanted to see what the mood of the body was in terms of taking an approach such as this.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Well, I hope that can be done. And I want to put people on notice that if that's not done, scholarship aid, taking all of it out, that's so important to me that there will be another filibuster if that doesn't happen. And I am much more boring than Senator Chambers, let me tell you. (Laughter) You wouldn't want that. No, I'm just trying to emphasize the fact that this is a big "dare you," kind of. And I'm a little reluctant to put that on the line. But if that's what everybody has agreed to, then I'm going to go along with it. But I very much hope that on Select File everybody agrees that the Raikes bill will be put ahead of the mainline appropriations bill. Thank you.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Janssen. I appreciate that there has been an agreement made. Senator Raikes, I do have a question, if you would yield.

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: LB 574, as I understand, lumps all three need-based scholarship programs into one. Can you just quickly review for me what the role of private institutions and private colleges is with LB 574?

SENATOR RAIKES: I will, Senator. The idea of the single pot of money, if you will, or the single program, better said, is that students who plan to attend any institution of higher education, be it public, private, independent, would go to that program for an award. So awards would be granted to students attending all those types of institutions, from that single program. The only
