you decide which students get that money? And the answer is, that's a combination of the decisions by the institutions who those students have...which those students have chosen, and the activities of the Coordinating Commission.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Okay. That makes it a little bit plainer. The other question then follows up with what Senator Chambers has been objecting to, those that go to private, independent schools. They're still in the mix?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes, absolutely.

SENATOR VRTISKA: And Senator Chambers is willing to go along with that? I'm...he's not here, but I assume, since you discussed this together, he's willing to go along with this?

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes. As I understand, Senator Chambers has said that he agrees with the concept of the bill, which is that, in effect, the student...the money...the award is to the student. The student then makes a choice as to where that student would like to attend...

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand that.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...higher education.

SENATOR VRTISKA: I understand that. And that's been talked about over and over again, but Senator Chambers was not at the time agreeable to that, because he maintains that no matter if it goes to the student, it still ends up going to the school, which of course is true. But if...you know, it appears that there's been a conclusion made here that...Senator Chambers, would you answer a question?

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, would you yield, please?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Chambers,...
