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figure.

SENATOR RAIKES: Well, I, of course, would also have to remind you facetiously that to the extent we're successful at reducing smoking, we reduce our revenues.

SENATOR JENSEN: I hope so.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. All right. Well, I...one other question. Isn't there a...or, wouldn't it be appropriate, let me ask it that way, that this sort of an ongoing program, if that's what it's intended to be, be funded out of the tobacco trust monies, rather than General Fund appropriations?

SENATOR JENSEN: That's certainly a thought. And you know, I don't know where we are between our...this big gap we've got out here, and if there will be any additional tobacco taxes imposed or not. I don't know.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: We'll have to see where all that plays out.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay. Well, I would appreciate your thought and ideas on doing that. Because unfortunately \$6 million is \$6 million. And as I see the budget situation, we don't have this fixed yet. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Jensen, Senator Raikes. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I pretty well...I think I've got my questions answered. But I have an...also a real concern of taking this money out of the General Fund when we have the tobacco settlement money. I realistically think that's where the area...that's where the funds should be directed from that area, because of the problems and the situation that it involves. I suppose I can live with it right now. But I'm very much concerned. And it was cleared up that it is only \$3 million from the Cash Reserve Fund to the General Fund for this purpose.
