\$5 million at a time that does nothing? That's what's been happening. That's the history of the matter. The rainy day fund is to try to smooth out government so you don't have to make this enormous draconian cuts and disrupt programs and disrupt government and cause enormous inefficiencies that are caused when you hire and fire, hire and fire, hire and fire, because you have money one time, you don't have it the next. We should be spending down the rainy day fund now. Our revenues are starting to take an upward turn, just barely,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...but now is the time when the rainy day fund should be used. That's what it's all about.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Beutler, your light is on next.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I said it. Thank you.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Beutler waives. Senator Bromm.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek, and I apologize. I wasn't going to speak again, but my philosophy on the rainy day fund, Cash Reserve Fund, differs from Senator Beutler's and it may be that my understanding is not clear. But what I want a Cash Reserve Fund and rainy day fund for is those things that come up that we cannot plan for, that we do not anticipate, such as unanticipated revenue falls, some judgment that comes out of the sky against the state, some disaster that we have no other way to provide for. And again, it may be that my understanding of the meaning of a Cash Reserve Fund or rainy day fund is not as accurate or...as Senator Beutler's, but to me that's what that fund should be for. We don't know what lies ahead of us in six months or a year. In the last couple of years, we've hardly been able to predict three months, let alone three years. We look at our revenues coming into the Revenue...Department of Revenue on a daily basis now, on a daily basis to see where we're at, and when you're doing that, you're not exactly on high ground. You are simply trying to keep your head above water. Fortunately, we've not had to issue warrants or tell the schools we can't send out your state aid money. We've sent it out when
