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You do it. Then do you require that they document by time how much time they spent doing it? That's just not the nature of activity. I'm just telling you that the county attorney did these services. He was awarded by the district court money not in an attempt to ignore the process of the Legislature, but simply did it on the basis that it determined that that was an appropriate amount for these various proceedings in what I will tell you again is a highly contentious county in connection with these type of proceedings. So I just want you to understand how this occurred. It was not a totally arbitrary figure. It was a figure based upon the experience of the district judge as to how much effort would go into these proceedings. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Pederson. Senator Chambers. And this will be your third time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are any other lights on?

SPEAKER BROMM: There aren't any others.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then I'll let this be my closing, if it's okay.

SPEAKER BROMM: That would be permissible.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I hope Senator Don Pederson does not take personally what I said about the judges. That's why I emphasized the judges. We cannot allow something of this nature to be viewed as piecemeal, where you automatically ring up this amount of money if it took you two minutes or two hours. Judges do not award lawyer fees on the basis of a guy coming in and saying, well, lawyers who handle...well, I'm not even going to try to give an analogy. I will just stick it...I will stick to what we're talking about here. Why would some judges require documentation before the state can be billed for this money? Because those judges realize that the Legislature ought to...if it doesn't, it ought to require documentation. These other two judges I think are very arrogant. I think they are disregarding not only of the Legislature, but of their ethics as a judge. They should take
