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SENATOR VRTISKA:    Let me respond by telling you, Senator Beutler, that there has not been a default since 1992 when steps were taken to change it. So there's not been a default in a payment back to the state since 1992. These were all prior to that.

SENATOR BEUTLER:    All prior to '92?

SENATOR VRTISKA:    So what I guess my...the reason I feel confident is, is because there has not been a default in this length of time. Apparently the problem, that was in terrible shape, has been fixed. And so we feel confident if things continue, and they have these kind of rules in effect, and they're following them, it's not going to happen. But it's too bad it happened when it did. And I agree with you. We need this money, and these people are certainly...should pay it. You have to understand, some of these doctors are not even in the state anymore. They're in...no telling where. They're hard to run down. Some of them have left...some of them are not even in practice. So there are a variety of things. But that's immaterial to the case. The case is that they were not followed up.

SENATOR BEUTLER:    Yes. Well, Senator, thank you. It's...I think it's important to note that nothing has happened...we haven't had a bad experience since 1992. So apparently the present administration has it under control. I'm glad to hear that. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM:      Thank you, Senator Beutler.      Senator Vrtiska, your light is next.

SENATOR VRTISKA:    Can I close?

SPEAKER BROMM:      No, there's another light.      Senator Vrtiska, you want to waive off this time?

SENATOR VRTISKA:    Yes, I'll waive off.

SPEAKER BROMM:      Senator Kremer.
