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SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Byars, you have seven minutes and fifty seconds.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Senator Chambers, and I'd yield some time to Senator Redfield.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Senator Byars. Tres bien, excellent, I am very pleased and I do want to share with the body that we have an alert high school student in our state and they have contacted us and thanked us for thinking of informing them about this important immunization. So thank you, Senator Byars, for your work. I will support the amendment and the bill.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Byars, you still have time if you would like it.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'd urge the adoption of the amendment and of the bill, and I'd yield my time back to the Chair.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Byars. Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker, I rise neither in support nor opposed to this legislation. Just would like to point out a couple of things to you. One thing is that there is no question this is a devastating disease when it occurs. It occurs rarely, but when it does, it's a total catastrophe. There is no question about that. I guess the thing that bothers me about this legislation is this. Why only this disease are we alerting our potential students to? And then the second thing is this, and at the bottom of the page it says each secondary educational institution shall request a confirmation signed by the student, parent, or guardian that the information has been provided...or has been received and reviewed. It seems to me this is unnecessary bureaucracy. Again, why don't we do this for everything this way? The bureaucracy that is occurring in our medical offices is becoming gigantic and now we are imposing
