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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I really don't want to be a problem here. And I recognize the need. It just appears to me that there is going to be started to collect enormous amounts of money...amount of money, with a program that we're still working through, and I appreciate that. I just want to raise a note of caution that because we are raising this with cash funds, and we are...it's a form of taxation, if you will, and it's going to a good cause. But I think we ought to realize there...we shouldn't be creating a fund that is...provides extra money early in the game, especially when we're so desperate for others. And I was trying to get at that nub by taking that if we put some in General Fund, or if...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...we come back here in January. He has another question.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Senator Wehrbein, I understand. But if you'll recall some of the dialogue with Senator Synowiecki and others, we do have providers out there who must be paid for services they're capable of rendering. Now, process and procedure for getting the people who need the treatments and the programs to these people needs to be established. But I'm not certain that it's such an elongated process that we won't be able to get the people into the treatment and the programs they need and we've never had enough money to provide, to pay the providers who are already established. We are not inventing everything from whole cloth. Much of this is in place. We simply need the process and procedure for integrating it and coordinating it and paying for it.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I accept that. I just want to...I will be interested in visiting with you over time. And I will just say...and this is absolutely no threat at all...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Time has expired.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: ...but we...
