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going to tell you what the bill does, but the committee amendment and what...and then probably back off so the committee amendment can be presented, and then there will be other amendments offered, and essentially what it's going to come down to is this. MIRF was set to sunset in 2009. This would sunset it this year. That was the original bill. City of Lincoln had bonded with MIRF as one of the backup pieces to that bonding would have possibly harmed their ability to work with the bonds, and I'll let Senator Beutler talk a little bit about that and the way they had guaranteed the bonds. So this was one of those things that came back to the Appropriations Committee late one evening, along with a lot of other technical amendments, and we were asked, because of the Lincoln situation, to make a trade-off and we did, and that was to take \$3 million from the regular aid fund and keep MIRF for two years more, so it was a wash. Now that's caused some more problems, so there will be some amendments to follow on that. So what you're going to vote on, have the first opportunity to vote on, probably will be the amendments to the committee amendment. But philosophically, you've got a few choices here today. First choice is to sunset MIRF and that means it's gone and the five years are gone instead of two. The League of Municipalities and others on the floor I'm sure would like us to sunset MIRF for two years and then put it back in for the next three. There will be technical amendments to deal with the Lincoln situation so that the cities, who right now, as it stands, have a \$3 million cut into the general aid program, will be able to keep the general aid program which has got more flexibility to it and...than the MIRF program does, and so that's an accommodation to them. So some of what you're going to be asked to do is technical. Nobody is going to have any problems with it. Here's my position. If you look at your status sheet for the out years, one of the things we have to do this session, and it's very painful to do, is to make the vertical cuts, and the vertical cuts are what the Appropriations Committee originally voted to do, to say let's sunset it. We could sunset it for two years, but I guarantee you in two years we'll be back with the same bill, same issues, same time on the floor, same committee issues to sunset it that year. Because we're going to be hunting revenue two years from now just the way we're hunting it now. And this is a program that's scheduled to sunset anyway, so you can do it now or you
