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change. I'm not familiar with the rules, themselves. No.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay. My understanding is all of the reportage, all of the information about acreage, percolation rate, all of those things are affected, and I need to get those to be certain. But if you're not aware, I need to get that information. But I'm wondering about the county board and the county commission, but if you're not familiar with them, you probably can't answer the question that I would ask. The other thing that I would ask, though, while you're at the microphone, is the first part of your amendment where you talk about the applicant for a conditional use permit or special exception may request a final determination. I received an e-mail from one of the zoning administrators from Madison and Pierce Counties saying that that would affect all conditional and special use permits, and that in the last year and a half Madison and Pierce Counties have issued over 30 special and conditional use permits, and that only 5 have been for livestock-related operations. They also deal with permits for salvage yards, landfills, liquor licenses, and that this would apply to all of those since it doesn't specify. Could you comment on that?

SPEAKER BROMM: Certainly, Senator Preister. I believe that I would certainly agree with that. This law or proposed law deals with conditional use permits, special exceptions. That section doesn't pertain just to livestock. So I think that would be accurate.

SENATOR PREISTER: Okay. Thank you, Senator Bromm. The concern, then, from zoning administrators on that is that according to this one, anyway, there is going to be a lot of court time and money spent by counties to defend the vague words. And that the courts are going to end up making some of the rules and the determinations, which is likely to put costs on the counties that those counties cannot likely stand at this time. And I think that's one of the considerations that we need to make if we're going to adopt this amendment, that...and I don't think that this zoning administrator is alone in that, but others may not have seen this at that time. And Senator Bromm is in agreement that this does apply...
