To me, when I first looked at that, whatever is relevant is reasonable, and that's why I just had the word any "relevant" information in the original amendment. In your mind, what's the difference between...what's the difference there? Is it that there may be matters that are peripherally relevant and, therefore, it would be unreasonable to require that particular information? Or let me stop there and just ask you to kind of comment on why was the word "reasonable" put in, and what did, whoever suggested it, think it might limit that the prior amendment did not limit by the word "relevant"?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Bromm, would you respond?

SPEAKER BROMM: There can be many ways to discourage an applicant for a conditional use permit and one way certainly can be to require voluminous information that isn't necessary in order for the county zoning authority to make a decision on whether or not this is something they wish to have in that particular location or not.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: If it pertains to the use of the property, if it pertains to the intensity of the use of the property, the environmental concerns, health and safety of the neighbors and the community, certainly that's reasonable and relevant. If it pertains to the ownership of another facility unrelated to the applicant or the use...the track record at another facility that may not be related in ownership to this applicant, that might be something so far afield that I think that might be an unreasonable request. And if it gets to that point, I think the good thing about this is...
