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I know that's something we are all trying to avoid, is the incurring of expense without some kind of probability of acceptance.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But is there something irreconcilable there or can that be reconciled? And are you intending that "reasonable" should take into account the cost of specific information, albeit relevant. I mean, information that's relevant, if it costs too much is it unreasonable?

SPEAKER BROMM: Is that all one question, Senator Beutler? (Laughter) Does that require a yes or no?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah, it's...it has subparts.

SPEAKER BROMM: Let me try to respond as best I can. Part of what a point I want to make is that a couple lines up from the reasonable information, you know it very clearly says special conditions or requirements may include but are not limited to the submission of information that may be separately provided to state and federal agencies in order to obtain the applicable state and federal permits. So I would assume that in order to get a permit from any of those authorities, we're talking about livestock, you're going to have to have a plan that will show what size lagoons you're going to have, how those lagoons are going to be...

SENATOR CUDABACK: If I may, Senator Bromm, you're now on your time.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...how they're going to be constructed and where they're going to be constructed. And the beginning of the question I kind of focused on...you said is it reasonable to require that the plan be submitted, and I kind of stopped there and I thought, you know, with a lot of the things that are available in how you do these things, certainly you'd want to know the plan. Because the prevailing winds, the distance from the neighbors, the type of waste facility and whether that's a facility that minimizes odor or not, that's part of the plan.
