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light on, and I'll expand on that. But you really have to...I have to explain this in some detail. And at least it makes sense to me. I don't know if it makes sense to you. But that's why I think that part of the bill is every bit as important as the other part. In fact, if I had to pick one, I'd pick that section over the other section. And please don't go put an amendment up to strike the other section. But I do say that. Thank you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Bromm. And I have to correct one thing Senator Bromm said. All of that so-called economic development that the state has been engaging in has not created any jobs of any significance in my area. I know you meant Omaha in general, Senator Bromm. But the city of Omaha is a greater enemy to me and my people than it is to the rural areas. So I will never be one of those ballyhooing or promoting Omaha, because it is a racist city. Its policies and practices are. When the mayor makes appointments, he puts people in place who are virtually voiceless, who are rubber stamps, and who do not speak in the best interest or for the best interest of the black people, of whom you think they're a part by virtue of their complexion. But the mayor is very careful about the kind of people he puts into positions in his cabinet. As a matter of fact, he and some of the Democrats in Omaha were very insulting to my community when they trotted some Democrats into the black community because the Republicans are kicking their tail all over this state, and now they suddenly want to run back to black people, who have been more loyal to that party than any other group. And we've been kicked in the teeth more by that party than any other group. And I'm making it clear to the people in my community that Democrats don't get a free ride. They're white, and they have the same interests...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...as other white people. Democrat and "Repelican" may have significance when white people are dealing with white folks' mess. But when it comes to black people, there is no significant difference. And I'm advising people in my community to look at the individual who is running for office, and not the party designation. Because our community
