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methods. So livestock is...production is going to be extremely critical if we're going to continue to have any hope for more young people being able to stay in the agricultural areas. Now, this section of the bill basically does two things. One, it says that the Department of Agriculture shall designate or adopt guidelines for what you would need to do to be a designated livestock friendly county. And then if the county board of that county wishes to present the county as being such, that county board could adopt a resolution, send it in to the Department of Agriculture, and I think they're going to be on their way. And if somebody wants to know where counties are that might be interested in increasing livestock production, that would be one way to point them in that direction. Secondly...and I think this could be very helpful to counties, and it's something that some counties have approached me on and said that they're very excited about, and that is the portion of the bill that ties in with this that says that the Department of Agriculture shall become a source of information, a repository, if you will, for the latest technology and ideas that would be helpful when a county is considering granting a special use or conditional use permit, where...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SPEAKER BROMM: ...can the county zoning administrator go to find experts or information on what the options are for locating a facility in this particular location, or for dealing with this type of livestock, whether it be chickens, cattle, hogs, or whatever. And so it ties together with giving the Department of Agriculture a little increased role and responsibility in facilitating livestock production in the state, in those areas where they wish to have it. This is not required for anyone. It is totally a voluntary designation, if a county should want to do that. So with that, Mr. President, I'll conclude my remarks. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bromm. Senator Baker on the Chambers amendment, FA1344.
