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expanding an existing one, I want there to be a fair process so that producer does not invest a great deal of money thinking that if he does this then he will be able to go ahead with his expansion plans, and then after you've dropped \$40,000 or whatever, after you've gotten all the appropriate permits from DEQ and whomever else you need to get them from, then the county board comes back in and says, oops, no, we've changed our minds. I think that would be totally unfair. Will this bill prevent that from happening? I don't want there to be the pressure on a planning commission or on a county board from anti-livestock people to change the rules in the middle of the stream. So I am in the process of trying to understand this whole process, how if we have this bill it will solve problems, if we...what is the worst thing that can happen if we don't have this bill, and what is absolutely the best thing if we do have the bill. If the county boards are still in opposition because of the final determination language, and I would think that the producer would have to have all of the information so he knows what to do, I would think that the county board would have to have all of the information so they know whether to grant or not. So I am in a state of total confusion and I have learned that one of the...Minnesota has nothing to do with Nebraska, but just for an example, Minnesota has one specific county that is the most dairy-intensive county in the state. I can't tell you the name of the county, but it doesn't meet the livestock friendly designation requirements. And so are we going to...Cuming County, for example, very intensive livestock operations. Is there going to be a problem up there where they won't meet the livestock friendly requirements? And, Senator Bromm, if you want the rest of my time to answer my questions or to expand on what I've said, you're welcome to it.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Bromm?

SPEAKER BROMM: Certainly, Mr. President. How much time is there?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About a minute fifteen.

SPEAKER BROMM: Okay. Thank you, Senator Hudkins, and I agree with an awful lot of what you said. I also want a fair process
