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SENATOR BEUTLER: Because it's just a one-step process, basically.

SPEAKER BROMM: That's right. That's right. So if it's based on something that's different than had been represented by the applicant or if the applicant changes anything like location or type of waste disposal system from what he represented it was going to be, but otherwise I'm not sure what to say. If there were simply a new technique or technology that became known since the initial decision before the issuing the permit, to me that would not necessarily be a fair thing to inject upon the applicant at that point, unless they were willing to adopt that, that new technology. I'm not sure I can say, yes, to your question. But there is so many ways that conditions could be attached to a determination that there may be a way to do what you're saying. I just can't quite bring myself to give it a blanket yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I'm just concerned by the possibility that a board may make a final determination. Some time passes as the permit is being approved by DEQ, and during that time, something comes up that the public...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...wants the board to consider, is logical to consider, and may, in fact, be important to consider but would not meet the criteria of your bill here for consideration. And then the board would be in the ugly position of having to say to the public that they reject an obvious major objective factor, possibly, simply because the law doesn't allow them to consider it. And I just hope we can avoid that situation because I think that would be frustrating for the public and for the board and an unhappy situation altogether. Thank you, Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, there are no further lights on, so you may either speak or you may close, whatever you choose.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I choose to speak, Mr. President.
