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And one of the things that the...both the underlying bill and the committee amendment does is to talk about genetic material more broadly than simply nuclear transfer. And I believe that what is proposed is much more expansive than even what Senator Schimek is speaking to, which is the therapeutic side of it. I think that almost all therapy would...that has any genetic relationship, would be prohibited by this. And I think that we need to fully understand whether or not we are going to ban in this state anything that is...that involves genetics, and especially genetics related to an egg. And I think that some of the language in the amendment, although the amendment is far superior, does that. We...it does not refer...it refers to somatic cell nuclear transfer. But that is not the operative piece about what we are banning. It's just a definition that exists without relationship to anything else in the amendment. And I just wanted to clarify with Senator Smith that the transfer piece is a cellular process. It is not the product. And it...and to use that terminology to differentiate between the two kinds of cloning that we're talking about I think just confuses the issue. There...the other thing that...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BROWN: ...may be important as we move forward is some understanding of the way that stem cells act. There is an article that I think someone passed out about how stem cells can begin to act reproductively, very similarly to eggs. And so are we...we may, even if we agree with the purposes that Senator Smith has, we may be limiting ourselves in a way that we don't want on one side, in terms of being able to fix at the genetic level conditions that would be passed along, and not dealing with cellular divisions...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR BROWN: ...that may mimic an action of an egg. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Smith, I'd
