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that there would be very careful consideration of therapeutic cloning that is done anywhere in our state, and...that's not the answer you're wanting.

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, what I'm really getting...what I'm really getting at is once the embryo is created you would agree with Senator Smith that...and many of the rest of us, that you would not want that embryo implanted for reproductive cloning purposes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Not want that embryo what?

SENATOR FOLEY: Implanted.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No, correct.

SENATOR FOLEY: For reproduction purposes, you would not want that embryo implanted. But...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Correct.

SENATOR FOLEY: ...you would allow a scientist to continue to work with the embryo so long as it's not implanted.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, is this a trick question?

SENATOR FOLEY: No. No, really, no, not at all.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I think...I think that's correct, yes.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yeah, I think that's where you're trying to take us. And, of course, the embryo is going to...those cells are going to divide and multiply and grow and so forth and where are you going to take us with this? How far can that scientist go with that embryo? If he can't implant it, what can he do with it?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, Senator,...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.
