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wondered whether they and I were interfering with God's will. If my heart was to stop, maybe that's what is supposed to be. Now that pacemakers are a common thing, you never hear that anymore. You know, there's the thing that I remember. Let me just...one other thing, or two, first. Birth control pills were invented by a very religious man, because he thought it would be an acceptable means of controlling the size of families and so on. There are groups of religious people still opposed to this. Are all of our proponents today...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR JOHNSON: ...still think that that is the case? The...what we come down to is this, is, we've had people get up and say, well, we can do this research and not that research, and so on. What is the difference? It's one's religious philosophy. And it has nothing to do with medicine. And I don't believe that the constitution says anything about, this group of people can determine for me or anyone else what research that I get to do or benefit from. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I pass for the moment.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Beutler passes for now. Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I guess this is one of those bills that in addition to having some very deep seated human emotions about and being concerned about limiting our ability to help people live and live healthy lives, I also have concerns that, from listening to some of the discussion, that maybe the bill, the way it's structured, is doing more than even the sponsors think that it's doing. And so I'd like to ask Senator Brown a question.

SPEAKER BROMM: Did you say Senator Brown?

SENATOR THOMPSON: Brown.
