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fifty seconds.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you. Senator Smith, if that were correct, would that be something you would say you would not want to do? Well, let me just ask you...forget the bill...is your intent...do you have any interest in prohibiting that type of genetic therapy?

SENATOR SMITH: No, I do not.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Smith.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Okay.

SPEAKER BROMM: Okay.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Okay. If that were...as we debate this bill, I'm beginning to wonder about some of this language. And...thank you, Senator Smith. I'm concerned that we're doing more than what we think, in terms of this bill. And I guess I know Senator Brown has worked on this for years. She's been speakers at national conferences...been a speaker at national...she hasn't been multiple speakers, I guess...been a speaker at conferences, and has worked on this a lot. And so I...her view of this carries a lot of weight with me, because that...no offense to Senator Smith, but I think this is an area that is one of her areas of expertise in the Legislature. So I'd be concerned about the structure of the bill for this purpose. And also, getting back to how we define "derive," "product," and some other things in the bill. And I'll yield my time back to Senator Brown. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brown, you have about three minutes and twenty seconds.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President, members, I...to come back to the issue that I have been focused on, in terms of the language, the definition, and how broad the definition is, there is legislation banning cloning. As far as I know, in other states it's only been banned...and I will need to check on that...on this...but for purposes of reproduction. But most of that
