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any time we get to choose that outcome or that result of reproduction, whether it's asexual or otherwise, I think we're begging for trouble. With that, I'll conclude my remarks. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Smith. Senator Schimek, followed by Senator Redfield and others.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Smith, what you just said has intrigued me, and I need to follow up before I have the opportunity to say what I had my light on to say. What do you mean, giving the opportunity to choose race?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: He sees that as...and history will tell you that genetics have come into the debate of racists. I mean, that's clear. And I don't need to elaborate on that. In fact, I hate to even think about it. But he sees this as a way of manipulating an outcome where we ought not manipulate.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And what kind of credentials does the friend have?

SENATOR SMITH: He's a common person. I don't understand why he wouldn't be entitled...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: I think he probably has about as much understanding of this as you and I do, Senator Smith. (Laugh) I think that is so extraneous to what we're talking about here that I would just encourage you not to even bring it into the conversation. But that's just my take on it. I would like to just respond just a little bit to Senator Foley. And I had...I think Senator Chambers actually said quite a few of the things that I was going to say. I had a constituent call after you and I had that exchange. And he basically said that, you know, a baby, a child, cannot grow without a womb. It needs that. You can't grow a baby in a test tube. You...an embryo couldn't grow unless you put it in a mother's womb, because the womb tells the cells what to do and what to become. And so I do...I did, as we
