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were closing, say it sounded like science fiction to me. And it still does, Senator. I think it...I think we need to keep the conversation on a more realistic track here. One of the things that I think it was Senator Stuthman was asking me about, was the therapeutic cloning. And Senator Stuthman, this article I was reading about this brand new research that's out, they actually have therapeutic cloning that can be done without a sperm being involved. And the essence of it is that it's kind of upset the apple cart, maybe, for those who oppose therapeutic cloning on the basis they believe that that embryo is life and therefore you shouldn't be using life like that. And that's a particular religious point of view. But if there has been no fertilization by a sperm, then I guess you can't make the same arguments. Or at least you have to ask, well then if the old idea that life begins at conception, when there is this cross-fertilization of the egg and the sperm, if that's no longer true, do we...I mean, how do you define life then? So I think that this new research is going to have a lot of implications for religions, as well as for science. And I guess that's one of the reasons I think we ought not to be fooling around with the therapeutic part of this. It has...the therapeutic cloning has...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...the potential to save so many lives, and to bring such results for people, for children particularly, who are suffering from diseases like diabetes, that have long-range implications for them. I think that's a life-giving kind of activity if we can do it. But even if you don't feel the way I do about it, think about the fact that there's so much going on out there now in the field, and we in here are not really well equipped to know all of that information. We don't spend our lives dealing with science and dealing with all of the kinds of experiments that are going on now. At the very least, I would say, maybe we should recommit this bill to committee. Maybe we should wait another year.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Maybe we should all do more study in this
