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Although we can choose to do that. And so the discussion here is extremely important. I think we need to think about where we're going. I think we need to think long and hard about what we're doing. Even when we develop a drug therapy, in America we so value human life that we're careful. We do the studies, and we don't start with the experiments on humans. We have a process in place whereby we take it step by step by step.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR REDFIELD: And yet here we have the origins of the human race, and we're talking about leaping into it without taking it step by step by step. And if it can't happen that it's implanted in a womb, then how is it that we have Dolly? One or two cases, not very many, and yet we're ready to leap into the human forum. I think we have a lot to talk about. Why should we do it now? Because every day that we put it off, we become more and more comfortable with plunging where we really don't have the answers. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Chambers on the motion to recommit.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, obviously I'm in favor of recommitting the bill. I would like to ask Senator Smith a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Smith, on page 2 of the committee amendment, in line 1, it says, "Somatic cell means a diploid cell." What is a diploid cell?

SENATOR SMITH: I would need to consult my notes, Senator, if you...
