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no, we don't need any new taxes. And as far as the argument goes that, yes, people are going to transfer any cuts in state aid to property tax, I don't buy that either, folks. These are local boards elected by the local people, whether they're school boards, city boards, NRD boards and so on, that make that decision whether to increase their property tax asking. They don't necessarily have to do that. It's not a given. I think that's demonstrated by what school districts did last year. They had the option of going up, replacing their state aid. Only half of them did that, so don't, please, don't try and make the argument to me that everything we cut is going to go right on to property tax. It didn't last year. We have a perfect example. Half the school districts made up their cut in state aid with increased property tax, half of them is all, so it's not an automatic given to me that they're going to do that. And the people out in my area are saying we're absolutely not. The state is suffering. It's time we cut some programs out in the cities, the counties, the school districts and so on. They're doing it. Actually, most of my school districts out there I think are budgeting for a worst case scenario, which would be the Governor's 10 percent state aid cut. I have a couple districts I know have done that in anticipation of the worst case scenario. We're not going to go there, but at least they're able to do these things. And I've had taxpayers from a couple of those school districts say it's about time. So I don't buy this argument that everything we cut in state aid, whether it's cities, counties, NRDs, school districts, is going to right straight on the tax rolls. It's not going to do that. It didn't last year; it won't do it this time. It's not a good argument. We have proof that it didn't happen. We also have a statement that military, retired military, people are coming into the state to retire in Nebraska. I dispute that. I have two of them moved out of my area just because they...one of them retired from North Carolina, happened to marry a Nebraska woman, moved out here and found out, lo and behold,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: ...Nebraska is one of only seven states that taxes military retirement income, one of seven states. It didn't take this fellow long to get out of Nebraska. He's not
