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have postponed that benefit to begin in 2005. So those are...you have to talk actuarial numbers and then also real numbers. The age 62 retirement will begin immediately. So we would have to deduct the \$92,370 from the first year, which was the \$2,000, and the second year, from the \$2,000. So...and then you can follow on down. The deficit, as we are talking about, in both cases, was \$726,000. We're looking at the second year of a cost of about 1.49 or 1.15. So also I would like to draw your attention to the yellow sheet. It compares the member contribution, employer contribution, and total contributions, the benefit accrued, or the percent of the compensation, and the difference. If you will look at the judges, presently they are contributing 4.5. That will be increased to 7 percent. The employer contribution will actually be increased to 15 percent. So we will have a total contribution, I believe, in the area of 22 percent. The benefit accrual cost, 19, but that's not exactly accurate, in the fact that we haven't figured in the one benefit, that early retirement benefit. But you can see that what was happening is that we were actually...the percent of compensation was higher than what the contributions were. So we have to try to bring that into balance. And that is what we are trying to do in this amendment. So I ask for your support. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I would like to ask Senator Brashear a question or two.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Brashear, would you yield, please?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Brashear, do you have a copy of the amendment before you? Because I'm going to look at page...the bottom of page 1, and go to the top of page 2. It would be subsection (3) of Section 1, if that helps you locate it.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes. I'm with you.
