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there was some levity there. I can tell you the farmers that don't pay income taxes are going broke, and there's been plenty of that here lately. And, you know, those of you who are against all these tax increases, I'd just remind you we don't have any coal mines in Nebraska, we have very little oil wells, and tourism is not a big revenue, and we're not going to be competitive with some of our neighboring states when it comes to tax issues. But hopefully we don't multiply the burden on agriculture by doing this. Like I said, if we didn't have a personal property tax on ag machinery, some of this would be more acceptable to me. Senator Landis, I suggest that we have an interim study resolution, we've tried that before, and compare how our taxes affect agriculture versus the states around us, and try and make some adjustments. And I know that this isn't a good time to do it and we're short of revenue,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...but I don't want to pile this on top of the ag community right now again because it's taxes on top of taxes. And I've always thought haircuts would be a good thing to tax. I know that you and Senator Raikes wouldn't pay much tax on haircuts, but some of us would pay once in awhile. So with that, I'll...I will conclude my remarks. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schrock. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. A little while ago I called the question on the committee amendment and the body was relatively divided, so I thought, well, I'll be getting a lot of questions now about the section that we want to take out of the bill that nobody's talked about. But I'll be happy to (inaudible) myself. Senator Schrock voted against calling the question. If there's a question you've got on the committee amendment, I'll answer it. Senator Stuhr spoke, Senator Kremer. Or are we just going to sit here and not take action on this piece? We've got a Preister amendment. Seems to me that we should have a Kremer amendment on the ag exemption. Can we not take some affirmative steps here about an issue for which no one has said one word and yet we wouldn't call the question on?
