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I feel no conscience. And I'm glad Senator Landis put me in this frame of mind. We'll see what happens on Senator Preister's bill to help these poor people, and they are poor people, trying to make it. And I'm glad Senator Loudon pointed out that they're not just in my district. There are poor people with these vehicles who don't drive them just because they love to drive old vehicles. If you think that's the case, offer to trade a better car for this thing you think they love to drive because they love the noise, they love the belching of fumes, they love all the clatter, the uncertainty whether when they stop for a light it's going to start again and get them through the intersection. You all don't know people who drive vehicles like that. I do. And I see them. And I feel for those people, because I know they're not on pleasure drives. They're probably going to some minimum wage job, or one where they don't even make minimum wage. They can't rely on public transportation. It doesn't run the hours when they need it, and it doesn't go where they need to go to do the work that might be available for them. Yeah, let's have a meltdown right here. I speak for the poor, I stand for the poor, I will fight for the poor. And I will fight all those who stand for the wealthy, who speak for the wealthy, who support the wealthy. I think they're very capable of taking care of themselves and their interests, like the railroads. That's why you don't tax their rolling stock. And the trade-ins, I think those are probably new and used car dealers. They can look out for their interests, and they prove it by getting those exemptions. But we ferociously, on this floor, attack the poor, the defenseless, the voiceless, and the weak. How much time do I have, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About one minute, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There was a judge overseeing a case where a poor widder's land was going to be taken, and a rich corporation lawyer from New York was there. And he had intimidated the jury, 12 upstanding citizens, ordinarily law-abiding. But he was so flashy, so overwhelming, he intimidated them, that they ruled in his favor to take the widder's land. And the judge set aside the verdict. He said, I want you all to understand that as long as I am a judge in this county, it will take 13 people, not 12, to steal a widder's land.
