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when you talk about poor people, the old adage that many farmers live poor and die rich is probably true, because through a lifetime, what they acquire is what makes them a living. And just like people who have trades have the skills that they're taught to make their living, and the only way you can make a living is to have property, to try to produce something off of that property and make yourself a living. If you're like you were last year, where I live, you didn't make any money. But believe me, you still had to pay taxes. And we're going to now add on another tax on that equipment that's sitting out there that can't be used very much if we don't get the rains, and...because I live in an area that doesn't have irrigation. And we don't have any water underground, so we don't have a chance for irrigation. So we have to look for the good Lord to send us the rains at the proper times, or we don't raise anything. And by the way, last year, we didn't raise anything. But I'll tell you right now, I still had to pay the taxes on my real estate if I expect to keep it. And I told you people the other day that my dad lost everything he had because he went through the thirties when he didn't raise anything, and what little he did raise he didn't get anything for. So we're back to that same point. And now we're going to put on another tax on top of the people in agriculture who are struggling to pay their bills and feed their families and take care of their payments that they're obligated to take care of. So I don't know what's right, as I said the other day. I'm not sure what's right. All of us here want to do what's right. But somebody has to lead us. Because we came out here with, apparently, the kind of bills that would fill the gaps that were in our budget, and slowly we're whittling away, to the point where at some point there won't be enough money to do it, and we have one option left, and that's to make cuts. And the question is, where are you going to make the cuts? That's what bothers me the most, because I know some of these, and there's no need in me going back into the dialog again about our K-12 systems...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR VRTISKA: ...and the problems they're having in financing our educational opportunity for the youths of this state, and the suffering that some of those systems are doing.
