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related to tobacco smoking or the ailments caused by that activity? There is no relationship between the money derived from the tax and the activity that produces the tax, or the harm to society caused by engaging in that activity. Here we have an activity that everybody knows creates problems. We've got two difficult bills that we're going to have to deal with related to driving under the influence. But you don't have any bills related directly to the harm caused by cigarettes. All you do there is tax the smokers to relieve the burden of taxation on others in society. If taxing cigarettes would end smoking, I would say that is indeed a noble utilization of taxing. If taxing would eliminate consumption of alcohol, the same thing. But there is no attempt in either case to eliminate the use...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...of the sinful, unhealthy product, but only to raise revenue. And since we have taken a deliberate decision time after time to tax, tax, tax cigarette smokers, I think it's time that we bring this sin into the chapel of taxation, and let it approach the altar and lay its sacrifice on the altar of taxation, and help bear the weight that the cigarette smokers have been bearing to date. Senator Friend told us this morning what General Patton was alleged to have said. And a character in a movie made that statement, talking about the carnage he saw from war, but added, and I love it. And Senator Friend said he loved what he saw happening yesterday. I don't know if he meant the carnage, the...whatever it was, but he's...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...going to have a chance to love a lot more before the session is over. Thank...was that my third time?
