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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, the whole...okay, as a whole. Thank you, that's all that I will need.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's at our present cut at three percent, with some add backs...or it's five percent with some add backs.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And now, this is a lesser cut than what the Governor recommended. Is that true?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What would be the dollar amount of the Governor's recommendation?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Eighty-one million.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Eighty-one? Thank you. You kind of took the wind out of me. Thank you, Senator Wehrbein. Members of the Legislature, if you adopt this amendment, the university need not suffer that cut that is in the mainline budget. There might be other people who want to cut the university even further. I'm going to show you what a fantastic set of circumstances has arisen. A professor at the university, who is tenured, and he works with a museum, or...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...for a museum, is one of eight people who work at that museum who are going to be fired. This professor asked for a vote of no confidence against the chancellor. But their rules say that the motion has to be made in one meeting and voted on in the subsequent meeting. There will not be a subsequent meeting until September. So it became necessary for the chancellor to take an unseemly action, which I will have to resume the next time I get to speak. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, Senator Chambers said something that I thought would be interesting if he knew a little bit about it. You talked about
