And when I bring bills and offer amendments of the kind that I'm doing today, they give me the opportunity because this that I've talked about flows directly from the use of John Barleycorn and the things that it will lead a person to do, even if that person is a member of the U.S. House of Representatives or the U.S. Senate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I'm going to ask that one of the Pages go to the Clerk's desk and get one of these amendment pads for me. Thank you. I don't like to have...be without a loaded weapon. And so that nobody will misunderstand, thank you, I always say a loaded brain is more powerful than a loaded gun. As I was leaving the building two days ago, a young black man was pushing a dust mop on the first floor by that circular desk, and he stopped me and ask could he tell me something, and I said, sure. He said, I come from New Jersey, and the neighborhood that I lived in had gangs and there was shooting, and although I had come to expect that to be what was going to happen, I walked around in fear all the time. Even when I came here, talking about Lincoln, I had this fear. Then he told me, looking right at me, and this is a young black man, I read in the paper where you said a loaded brain is more powerful than a loaded gun. And this is exactly the way he said it. He said, "p-h-s-t," raised his hands from his chest up into the air, said, fear left me, just like that and I haven't
