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she has anything of value. After all of his or her things of value are sold, he or she will begin to do that to those who are family members. When the family member will no longer tolerate the person coming around, the person goes to friends; when if friends will not allow it, to acquaintances; when the acquaintances wake up, the person will go to people who are similarly addicted and try to see if that addict will share with this addict some of what that substance is. When that fails and the substance costs some money, the person will do whatever it takes to get the money. Theft will be attempted. If that is not successful, then robbery, burglary, anything. Some people will sell their bodies. Some people have sold other people's bodies, and some have even sold and traded their children. So this is not a simple matter that is being dealt with. But since society is never going to try to eradicate the underlying problems, we're going to continue to have addiction, the futile efforts to try to cope with it, and the ongoing duplication and replication of more addicts. If a person wants to get rid of malaria, you cannot do that one mosquito at the time. You've got to find something that will eradicate the mosquitos that are carrying the germ or you have to inoculate people so that they will be immune to the ravages that the germ brings. But you cannot kill a mosquito here, a mosquito there and hope to address the problem. You cannot dry out one drunk here, you cannot clean up one drug addict there, and be dealing with the problem of addiction. Why do people get in this plight in the first place? Very few people not directly connected to that person even cares. And it's not always due to a lack of compassion. Most people have so many problems of their own, trying to make a living; trying to get along with a spouse or a significant other; trying to figure how to keep their child from going crazy, going to drugs, getting pregnant, impregnating somebody, going to prison, becoming a gang member, becoming a thief; so sleep is disturbed and people are at their wit's end. And nobody has a solution to any of these problems. One of the difficulties is that those who say that they're going to solve the problems often are contributors to the problem and derive income from the problem, or may share the problem. So none of that is going to be dealt with. We, in the Legislature, cannot solve those problems with legislation. We are aware that certain of these substances are legal.
