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features that can be put into one bill and draw 30 votes. If they try to do it through several votes, there might...several bills, there may not be enough time in the session to do that. But if there is enough time and they send three bills and the Governor vetoes each one, those of you all who have been around here a little while know that a veto automatically knocks votes also. If it passes with 30 votes, that's not enough to ensure an override. The Governor knows it, Larry Bare knows it, I know it. The only one who won't know it is the person whose bill it is because he or she will be hoping and praying that something that has not happened ordinarily will happen with his or her bill. And I'm sure it won't happen. Some people think there will not be a special session because it costs some money. That has never stopped the special session from occurring. That is a session that ought to be dedicated to the liquor industry because they are the ones, at least at this point, pushing us inevitably to that occurrence. For the life of me, I cannot understand why the Legislature is so beholden to the liquor industry. Those people who send e-mails to my colleagues, I don't have it, and some people are infuriated that I don't have it so they take out their fury on other people who do have it and try to get them to explain why I don't have it. And they are doubly angry because they cannot let me know directly how angry they are with me. They got too much time on their hands. But nevertheless, they are watching, and they'll ask, is it true, does the liquor industry run the Legislature? Isn't Chambers lying when he stands on the floor and say that the tax that is proposed in the bill, the way it exists now, was permitted to the Legislature by the liquor industry? They said they'd go along with it and that's why the Legislature adopted that level of taxation.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the answer will have to be, no, he's not lying; that's what was said on the floor in so many words. The liquor industry agrees to this. They'll accept this, so that's what the Legislature's course of action is. When we get to the tobacco tax, I'm just going to harken back to what I'm saying today, and I might even get a transcript and just read it, and it'll take me longer to read it than it takes me to say it. And
